and Physical Education (ICSSPE), followed by the EFPM General Assembly. The topic of the congress is "The Fair Play values – bridge between sport and culture for Europe without discrimination". It will be held on 9-11 October 2014 in Riga's new National Library called Castle of Light, which is a national symbol of Latvia.

The patron of the event, Jānis Lūsis, is one of Latvia's most remarkable personalities. He won a full set of Olympic medals and was the top javelin thrower of the world in the 1960s and early 70s.

We are convinced that the Congress will be a huge success due to the confirmed well-known keynote speakers, the opportunity to discover the richness of Latvia's history and culture, as well as the professionalism, warm attendance and friendliness of the Organizing Committee under the leadership of Raimonds Bergmanis, Vice-President of the Latvian Olympic Committee, and Baiba Veisa, Executive Director of the Congress. With respect to the above mentioned Congress, Riga was as well host of the 51st session of the Executive Committee of the European Fair Play Movement, which was held on 8-10 May 2014. The Executive Committee members visited the Latvian Olympic Committee, the Ministry of Education and Science and the Municipality of Riga. Remarkably, all three Institutions are financially and operationally



supporting the organization of the 20th EFP Congress in Riga. In particular, the meetings



were focused on exchanging ideas and new steps with regard to the Congress in October. Other issues included President Christian Hinterberger talking about the development of the Master Plan 2013 and Treasurer Katarina Raczova presenting the financial situation of EFPM. Moreover, the Executive Committee unanimously on the draft of EFMP's Flame Award and Spirit Award, introducing new awards honoring acts of Fair Play and spreading its values.

Hosszu' performances during the 2013

season were of course extremely impressive claiming two titles in the women's 200 and 400 metres individual medley at the World Championships in Barcelona. But she was honoured by the Fair Play Committee of the Hungarian Olympic Committee under the leadership of its President Jenő Kamuti for her work in helping to secure the 2021 World Aquatic Championships for Budapest, awarded to the city by the International Swimming Federation (FINA) in July last year. Katinka Hosszu interrupted her schedule during the Barcelona World Championships to join the Hungarian bidding team to present to the FINA Bureau the merits of Hungary hosting the 2021 championships.

## We are delighted to inform you of some outstanding acts of Fair Play that took place recently:

Already leading 2-0 in a Bundesliga match versus Nuremberg 2-0, Werder Bremen-striker Aaron Hunt fell in Nurnberg's box and the referee awarded a penalty. Hunt, who only tripped without any contact from the defender, explained to the referee that he had not been fouled by Nuremberg defender Javier Pinola and caused the penalty decision to be overturned. "Out of instinct, I wanted to provoke the penalty, but that was wrong," Hunt, 27, told afterwards. Asked about Hunt's Fair Play, Pinola said, "I take my hat off to him." The Bundesliga has rightly awarded Aaron Hunt with its Fair Play-Plaque for this exemplary act.

Showing solidarity, willingness to help and cohesion, the sport world came together to help those hit by the floods in Serbia and Bosnia and Herzegovina. The International Olympic Committee, the European Olympic Committees and many national Olympic committees donated money in order to support food-relief efforts and to help those who suffered from the catastrophic situations. Similarly, not having forgotten his origins, Serbian tennis star Novak Djokovic has donated the entire prize money from his win at the Italian Open in Roma to his foundation, aiming to build new kindergarden and schools.

Based on the initiation of sports reporter David Szántó (HUN), the 28th SPAR Budapest Marathon hosted a very unique and special event. Representing the 42 participating countries of 5 continents, 59 children were running a relay to stand out for the goal of UNICEF that zero children should die of preventable causes. It was a world premiere relay and the most exciting kilometer certainly was the running of a 9 years old Palestinian and a 14 years old Israeli boy. They ran hand in hand on the famous Chain Bridge, showing the world that nationalities, origins, skin colours and religion are not reasons for separation.
